I am sure you will all agree 2022 was another interesting year with some celebrations but also some sad times. I think all our hearts went out to the Association of Ukrainian Guides and I know many units in our county raised money, helped with emergency appeals or bought badges to support our Guiding friends in Ukraine.



One of the main celebrations of the year was the Queen's platinum jubilee with many units, divisions and districts holding parties to celebrate our patron's remarkable milestone.



Richmondshire Division were at Barneybeck and lit a campfire beacon as part of the national beacon lighting. Three leaders in the county were honoured to go to London to see the jubilee pageant and two other leaders were equally honoured to be invited to join a garden party followed by Evensong in York

Minster at the invitation of the Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire and the Archbishop of York. Experiences that will never be forgotten and proof of the wonderful opportunities Girlguiding can open up to adult members as well as our young members.



Nearly 70 guides and 30 leaders attended Ready Steady Camp at Barneybeck in June where lots of camping skills were learnt, we had 14 patrols and they all cooked their own meals on a mixture of gas and wood fires. As a result of covid, the majority of these girls had never camped before. Thanks has to go to Joyce and her team for making this weekend happen and sourcing enough equipment for 14 patrols to cook, not to mention enough gadget wood to make 14 traditional washing up stands!

Strictly Come Guiding saw the county come together at Waddow Hall in July for a great weekend of training, fun and friendship. Congratulations to the winners of the glitterball trophy, who knew pitching a pop-up tent, making the longest paperchain possible out of a piece of A4 paper or stretching a curly wurly the furthest would be quite so competitive.





We had a stand at the North Yorkshire county show in September where lots of people came and toasted marshmallows. Hopefully we raised our profile but it is difficult to know if we gained any new members as a direct result but thanks to all the leaders who gave up their day to help out on the stand. Following on from all the celebrations for the Queen's jubilee, we obviously had the very sad time in September of her passing away. Six days before the funeral, Girlguiding were asked to find some volunteers to help with Operation London Bridge. By nature of the timescale concerned there was very little time to open this offer up to leaders, but I knew this was something I had to volunteer to do having been promising to serve the Queen since I first made my promise as a Brownie. On the day of her funeral I was volunteering on Kensington High Street and was at the gates of Hyde Park as her hearse drove past, something I will never forget.





Many of you I know supported Jasmine Harrison on her mammoth swim from Lands Ends to John O'Groats. Profits from our badge sales enabled us to send a small donation to the two charities Jasmine was fundraising for.

There has been several leaders the division has said goodbye to and also several we have welcomed. Without you our leaders of which we have 123 none of the following could take part and for that I thank you.

A Brownie division trip in June to Waddow Hall for Magic & Mayhem was thoroughly enjoyed with 9th Scarborough, 1st Seamer & Irton, 1st Forge Valley, 1st Scalby, 4th Scarborough (Salvation Army), 3rd Scarborough (St Marks) and 5th Wreyfield Brownies attending.



There have been numerous sleepovers and camping trips with Westborough Guides camping in May at West Heslerton, St Marks Guides spending a weekend at Holme House with an Alice in Wonderland theme. Forge Valley Guides and Rangers attended Wellies and Wristbands at Waddow Hall. Scarborough West Rangers went to Edinburgh last November visiting the Christmas markets. 14th Scarborough units have had a Frozen Sleepover in the church hall and visited London.

There have been many unit visits; Mrs Pots Pots, Creative Café, Olympia for bowling, Skytrail and Alpamare. Peasholme Park is still a firm favourite, with a nature walk for 1st Northstead Rainbows, several Brownies sailing boats on the pond and photos been taken by Guides for the photo badge. Lots of units finished the summer with a BBQ be it down the beach or at the meeting place. The Panto at the Spa was attended by 2nd Westborough and 1st Northstead units. Barneybeck Annual Report for 2022

Spring is a lovely time at Barneybeck and spring 2022 was no exception. The sheep had eaten the grass back to the boundary fences over the winter and the daffodils were a riot of yellow.

During 2022 the project to re-introduce water voles to Wensleydale moved forwards a little with the fencing of the beck in our field as part of an enclosed paddock including our neighbour's land. The plan is to keep the rabbits from eating the water vole's food. However the much anticipated arrival of the water voles was postponed until May 2023.

The Girlguiding UK Generation Green project ended in March 2022. The stainless steel sinks that were given to Barneybeck as part of this project are scheduled to be installed in spring 2023.

Key-safes were put in place on the toilet block and in the large barn. This has proved to be very successful especially now that access to the postal system has become so much more difficult and expensive.

The main gate to the site remains chained and padlocked to prevent misuse of Barneybeck's car-park by the public.

In the autumn Girlguiding NYNE helped the Swaledale Mountain Rescue swift water and river group by allowing them to use the Barneybeck car-park while conducting a training exercise at Redmire Falls.

In 2022 Barneybeck was the place to stay for 580 young people. Some stayed one night, some stayed a weekend and some stayed a whole week.

Leyburn Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers held their weekly meetings at Barneybeck during the summer term. It is lovely to see the campsite being used for regular meetings as well as camping.

Once again NYNE can be very proud of our campsite which provides such an opportunity for young people to enjoy being outdoors.

Holme House Annual Report for 2022

Holme House, Esk Valley, Nr Grosmont. YO22 5BG



Holme House is our County's very own holiday house and campsite. If you have never been, it is well worth a visit. The house sleeps a maximum of 24 girls and 6 leaders and has a well-equipped kitchen, dining room, sitting room and separate activity room. There are toilets, wash basins and showers.

Outside there is a garden with a campfire circle,

front courtyard and fabulous views over the North Yorkshire Moors Railway. Grosmont is a short walk away and Goathland a little further away, but a good walk.

The camping field measures over half an acre and there are tents and equipment for you to use if you need them, or of course you can bring your own. There is also a barn to use with the campsite, which has electrics with fridges and a freezer, as well as space that can be used for activities if the weather is not too good. Presently, there is only 1 toilet and sink for use by the camping field, you are welcome to bring your own camp toilets and tents or hire ours. However, we have plans to turn a current cart shed into a shower and toilet block (hopefully for 2024). The bookings for last year at Holme House and the Campsite were fewer than before Covid, but we hope this lull is only temporary.

While the site has been closed over the winter, the Committee have been concentrating on brightening the place up and carrying out repairs. We have been lucky enough to have the Skills 4 Life Team, part of the Anglo-American Woodsmith Foundation charity, doing some decorating for us and the house is beginning to look fresher and brighter.

Training Report for 2022

Firstly, I would like to send a huge thank you to all volunteers who have given of their time to complete training, whether that be 1st Response, Safe Space, Leadership Qualification, programme or sectional training. Not only are you extending your own knowledge and skills but ultimately you are in a better position to make a safe, supporting and relevant environment for our young members to have fun, grow and develop as well-rounded individuals - thank you.

2022 saw the continuation of both face-to-face trainings and blended learning, a mixture of face-to-face and online sessions. Whilst getting back to normal after COVID we managed to run one large event that was held over from 2020!

Ready Steady Camp 2022



67 Guides and 30 Leaders from 9 units joined together for our first "Ready Steady Camp" at Barneybeck in June.

The objective of the weekend was for the Guides to develop their camping and outdoor cooking skills and they certainly achieved that and much more.

Split into 14 patrols, 7 cooked on wood using altar fires and 7 cooked on gas stoves. The patrols then swapped over for their next meal so they could gain experience of cooking on both. Leaders helped supervise where needed, teaching the girls everything from how to light fires in windy conditions to chopping an onion. The cooking went down very well and the girls tucked in, enjoying the fruits of their labours. Not everything went to plan however, as at least one group ended up with rather runny custard! The Guides gained more skills on Saturday from visiting 3 zones, firelighting, knots and lashings and survival skills. From their knots and lashings they were able to hoist a flag and make a washing up stand to use later.

In firelighting they practiced backwoods cooking (and eating!) and made some yummy biscuits in cardboard ovens.

The Guides also gained some survival skills by building shelters, practicing compass



points and learning how to filter water. Rachel, our County Commissioner, thought that the Guides should experience some real survival conditions, so laid on some tasty critters and dehydrated food for them to try!

For a bit of fun and light relief we had some silly games in the evening which involved space hoppers, water and big knickers (look out for the pics of Leaders in theirs!). Then it was off to the campfire for some singing, camp fire skits and smores before heading to bed for a well-deserved early night.

After cooking their eggy bread and beans on Sunday morning and making their bedding rolls, the Guides went on an incident hike round the campsite. They enjoyed more challenges such as making balistas, sending messages via semaphore and transporting water over the beck. The County is a branch of Girlguiding, which with its branches forms the United Kingdom's largest voluntary organisation for girls and young women. A report on Girlguiding's public benefit activities during the previous year can be found in its latest Annual Report.

Trustees:

The trustees are the officers of the County and the voting members of the executive committee, who are appointed by the general membership in accordance with the regulations of the Guide Association. The names of the trustees are listed below.

Public Benefit

The trustees complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission. The County has continued to provide public benefit activities, in particular by providing organisational and administrative support and training to subsidiary branches of Girlguiding within the County, and promoting more broadly the charitable objects of Girlguiding for the benefit of girls and young women.

Activities

A Camp weekend was held in June for Guides across the County. They enjoyed a weekend of traditional campin activities. Leaders were able to go to Waddow Hall for a training weekend, and we also held County Leaders' Day and First Response trainings.

Results

The County has traditionally expected its income to cover its costs, but this year the decision was taken to charge only nominal fees for training sessions. The Waddow weekend therefore cost £5100.

Donations

No significant donations have been received in this year.

Policies

Investments

Most of the funds are held in interest earning bank accounts but some are invested in approved funds as shown in the accounts. All investments need the prior approval of the Trustees.

Reserves

The funds are held for various purposes as shown in the fund summary on page 4. The property fund forms a firm foundation for the future maintenance of the fabric of the property at Barneybeck and Holme House.

The non cash assets are held for use by all members within the County to help in the

carrying out of the Guiding programme for girls and young women

The county prepares a budget each year before setting the level of subscription required.

The NYNE part of the subscription has traditionally been set at a level which would provide funds to meet at least that year's running costs along with any other known events or commitments, including an annual contribution to the property fund. However, prior to the Covid pandemic, a review of the reserves led to the decision to invest more in our volunteers and also to pause the annual property fund contribution.

Going Concern

Our numbers are increasing but are still well below pre-pandemic levels.

However, our reserves are still substantial and the County is still financially stable.



Future Plans

In 2023 we have planned activity weekends at PGL for Guides in July and for Brownies in September, and a day out for Rainbows. We also hope to run some Water activity days for Rangers, Guides and Brownies.
